

Librarians love cardigans and to honor local hero, Mister Rogers, and World Kindness Day we wore ours. In the spirit of #PT4Kindness and #RachelsChallengePT,

we also collected extra Halloween candy, Toys for Tots, PT Food Pantry items, and gently used clothing and toys for Washington County charities. We thank our generous community for donating to these local giving projects.

In other news from Youth Services, we hosted our 2<sup>nd</sup> annual indoor PTPL Mini-Golf Course with 166 participants this year. Ms. Sydney coordinated 9 holes of fabulous family-friendly competition. We were honored to have Mr. Paul Lauer join in the fun with his "Taming the Dragon" hole which by the way was a flaming favorite! Our staff used their creativity to design the other 8 holes from Star Wars to Recycle-Mania.

Our November Jigsaw Puzzle Swap had 51 participants who dropped off 269+ puzzles! They're looking forward to keeping busy this winter and can't wait for spring when they'll be ready to trade for more.





The McMurray Art League showcased their vast artwork collection for one week in our lobby and sponsored an Artisan's Saturday Market with hand-crafted items for sale on our second floor. Their membership consists of 100 talented local artists.
