which document the site of the Canonsburg Lake dam in North Strabane Township in 1939 and 1940 before it was constructed and one of Yup Krebs posing with a survey theodolite in front of

his Peters Township home around 1960.

# **Biography/History**

Reinhart J. "Yup" Krebs (1915-2004) was born in the Pittsburgh neighborhood of Beechview. Krebs was a registered professional engineer who began his engineering career in 1939 working as a surveyor for Benjamin H. Aires. During World War II, Krebs worked as a project manager for the Baltimore and Ohio (B & O) Railroad supervising strategic construction projects.

After World War II, Krebs formed Krebs Construction Company with his brother Al and friend Eve Laucik and worked as a builder and land developer in the South Hills of Pittsburgh. Krebs is best known for the Krebs Professional Center, a retail and office building located on Route 19 in Peters Township, Washington County, Pennsylvania that his company began constructing in 1950 and which he and his wife Margaret Jane "Janie" Moore Krebs managed until 1998.

As a resident of Peters Township, Krebs was a charter member of the Peters Township Chamber of Commerce and of the Kiwanis Club of Peters Township. In the 1970s, he served on the Peters Township Board of Supervisors for nine years.

Yup acquired his nickname when his younger brother, unable to pronounce "Reinhart" began calling him "Yuppie Cups."

### **Collection Scope and Content Note**

The collection consists of three black and white photographs.

Two of the photographs were taken by Krebs while working as a surveyor in 1939 and 1940 and document the site of the future Canonsburg Lake dam in North Strabane Township, Washington County, Pennsylvania. The artificial lake was created by the Aluminum Company of America (ALCOA) in 1943 to provide a freshwater reservoir for its Canonsburg Forging Plant during World War II.

The third photograph, taken by Pittsburgh photographer Ben Spiegel, is a photograph of Krebs posing with a survey theodolite in front of his Peters Township home around 1960.
