### **Read Local Eat Local**

September 6<sup>th</sup> marked the sixth Read Local Eat Local author showcase at the library. This event was generously funded by The Peters Township Library Foundation, who helped purchase the tents, tables, and additional entertainment fees for the event. This event features local writers, illustrators, and food trucks in a unique festival celebrating authors. 22 authors and three food trucks headlined this year's event, with over 400 visitors purchasing books, meeting authors, grabbing lunch, and enjoying the local talent. ### **Historical Hunt**

October is American Archives Month! Visit and learn about 12 historical Peters Township sites this October with information and images provided by the Peters Township Public Library Archives. The PTPL Archives acquires, preserves and makes available to the public original unpublished records documenting the history of Peters Township.

Most of the selected sites have historical images and records that are available in the PTPL Archives. Participants can visit the library in person or at [ptlibrary.org](http://ptlibrary.org) to get a list of the sites. Each site has a yard sign posted with a historical image and QR code where you can learn more about the history of the location. Participants who learn about all 12 sites can come to the library and enter their name into a drawing for local history notecards. The PT Historical Hunt will be up through the month of October.
